Per Coalition By-laws, directors are elected by the membership at the Annual Meeting. To ensure diverse representation and expertise, a Nominating Committee presents a slate of directors to the membership. There are at least 9 and no more than 21 directors from government agencies, service providers, faith based organizations, each of the regional areas of the BoS CoC, and a homeless/formerly homeless individual. Vacancies that occur during the year are filled by the sitting Board of Directors for the remaining term of the vacancy. Officers are elected annually. This process is believed to be the most effective in ensuring representation across the Balance of State.

Yes, the primary-decision making group (KSHC) would have the capacity to responsibly manage HUD administrative activities. Currently KSHC Balance of State staff and KSHC Board members coordinate the CoC application process which includes: convening the CoC Committee consisting of BoS stakeholders to complete and submit Exhibit 1; providing technical assistance to grantees to complete Exhibit 2's; coordinating and managing the process for new project selection; monitoring existing projects through site visits, phone calls, and APR reviews; and providing technical assistance to grantees as needed. KSHC would utilize additional resources to develop/enhance the service capacity in underserved rural communities.

The 2011 HIC listed 108 beds more than 2010 but should have shown a decrease of 3. 25 beds for individuals were lost due to program closures and 1 was omitted incorrectly. 178 individual beds were added including 158 for Veterans, 152 of which were included in the TH inventory in 2010 and were moved to ES in error. The total emergency shelter beds for individuals should be 405, not the 555 in the HIC, an increase of 15 from 2010. 86 beds for households with children were lost in the ES inventory in the last year, 47 from program closures and 39 omitted from the HIC in error. 29 new beds were added to this inventory. The correct number of ES beds for families is 466, a net loss of 18 family beds over the past year.

265 HPRP beds (79 household units) in the Balance of State Continuum of Care were omitted from the 2011 Housing Inventory Count. Improved coordination between the Balance of State CoC and the Kansas Housing Resources Corporation, who manages HPRP, will result in more accurate reporting in 2012.

While a total of 57 less TH beds were included in the 2011 HIC than 2010, the correct number of TH beds is 695, an increase of 95 in the last year. The 2011 HIC shows that 172 TH beds for individuals were lost. 152 were Veterans beds in the Domiciliary which were moved to ES in error. Only 20 were due to program closures. 24 beds were added for a true net increase of 4 individual beds and an inventory of 299. 12 beds for households with children were lost due to a program closure and reduction in capacity but 103 were added resulting in a net increase of 91 beds for families.

The 2011 HIC shows an overall decrease of 26 beds from 2010, 20 for households with children and 6 for households without children from 2010. All but 2 of these beds are from Section 811 and TBRA programs that should not have been counted in 2010 as they are not designated for homeless persons. The remaining 2 beds were over-counted in the 2010 HIC. Missing from the HIC is 163 HUD VASH vouchers in the BoS, 98 for chronically homeless individuals. With those included the CoC has 253 total permanent housing beds, an increase of 137 over the previous year.

A survey was conducted online to gather initial information for the 2011 HIC, with follow-up phone calls to non-respondents. A series of conference calls which included BoS CoC stakeholders, the HMIS provider, and lead agency representatives, produced several drafts of unmet need based on a review of the HIC data, HUD unmet need formula, the Kansas Balance of State Point-in-Time Count of January 2011 (sheltered and unsheltered), provider opinion and local data. Final review and approval of the unmet need was reached via conference call with the previously named CoC members.

MAAC provides a user guide, training by request, as agencies join the HMIS, upon turnover, and refreshers. MAAC staffs a support desk 8-5, M-F and a support line 24 hours. An HMIS subcommittee focuses on improving accuracy through standard operating procedures and assessment of training needs. The variance between 2010 and 2011 is due to the new MAACLink software providing better info on quality issues, and a significant difference between the old and new workflows providing a data migration challenge and a steep learning curve for users. With user training complete, the focus is moving to an understanding of how program data affects the CoC. This shift, and new features rolled out, are opportunities for a renewed focus on data quality.

The HMIS subcommittee which meets monthly has implemented a Data Quality Assurance Plan and Agreement for data entry compliance throughout the entire CoC. The supportive housing programs must enter their client records in HMIS in a timely manner to match their case files. There was a 65% rise in HH w/children in 2011 compared to the 2009 PIT & a 61% increase in the # of persons showing family homelessness growing in the BoS. There were small changes in the # of HH w/out children (.5% decrease) as well as the # of persons (.5% increase) compared to the 2009 Count. Overall HH increased 7% with a 19% increase in persons. Challenges facing BoS rural/frontier counties include a lack of affordable housing and inadequate income. The 2010 Census noted 139,423 persons in the 101 BoS counties worked but had income below 100% of poverty in the 12 months preceding the Census. About 32% of housing in the BoS counties was renter occupied. When the tenants' pay drops, employment ends, or medical crisis strikes, they are more vulnerable to eviction/loss of housing. Rural/frontier counties typically have limited access to resources and need more transportation to reach them. Rising gas costs & downsizing of services/resources, i.e. closing of state welfare offices, were likely key factors in the increase in homelessness among families in the BoS. Unsheltered HH w/children stayed the same with 3 less persons in 2011. There were 49 unsheltered HH w/out children in 2011 (42 in 2009) with 51 unsheltered persons (46 in 2009). The steady & low number of unsheltered HH/persons in the PIT Counts were likely due to the predominant rural/frontier counties where without shelters the homeless tends to double up in crowded living situations.

Persons in sheltered situations were surveyed in structured interviews conducted by provider staff/trained volunteers. The survey was piloted and the instrument revised prior to 1-26-11. The BoS is divided into 8 regions, with regional coordinators as team leaders to identify providers, solicit participation, distribute forms, and provide support/training before and during the count.

Sector maps were distributed and utilized by county team leaders to determine logical county canvassing locations. Team Leaders then tracked volunteer movement to document and report on sectors covered. County officials were asked to identify possible sites not meant for human habitation where trained volunteers might find homeless individuals and families. Volunteers were asked to drive, walk or use a combination of driving and walking in assigned areas where the homeless individuals/families might be located.

The first letters of the respondents' first, middle and last names were analyzed and compared with their dates of birth (DOB) and the locations in which the surveys were completed. Respondents were also directly asked if they had already participated in a survey with someone else that day. When initials, DOB and locations were not adequate, the number of family members / spouses was reviewed to determine more specific information and prevent duplicate surveys. Each potential instance of duplicate surveys was reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Surveys that did not contain sufficient information to rule out duplication were considered incomplete and were excluded from the analysis.

Describe the CoCs efforts to reduce the number of unsheltered homeless households with dependent children. Discussion should include the CoCs outreach plan (limit 1500 characters):

There are 4 PATH programs engaging families through street outreach in Lawrence, Ottawa/Paola, Manhattan & Salina to connect them to housing .The CoC outreach plan targets those most likely to encounter unsheltered families, i.e. school homeless liaisons, domestic violence programs, & community action programs.The CoC will continue efforts to work w/mainstream programs that offer rental/support services to develop holistic plans to move families out of homelessness. Action steps include: working w/PHA's and other subsidized housing programs to gain priority for homeless families on waiting lists; developing relationships with landlords & other housing providers to work with families with multiple barriers; & working w/housing developers & local government to develop additional affordable housing units. The Kansas Housing Resources Corp. was awarded HPRP funds to serve the BoS CoC area. These funds establish centralized access points. The primary sub-grantees were 3 community mental health centers which agreed to serve as a point of entry for a "No Wrong Door" approach for an approximate 1/3 of KS. Homeless persons dialed 2-1-1 to be referred to the closest HPRP access point. When the program ends in 2012, HPRP will continue as part of ESG in the BoS CoC. KSHC's 2011 CoC application includes 3 new projects: a PH Bonus project in Cowley Co. for 4 homeless families and a transitional program for 4, and a transitional program for 8 homeless families in a 28 county area in SW KS.

Describe the CoCs efforts to identify and engage persons that routinely sleep on the streets or other places not meant for human habitation (limit 1500 characters):

The BoS CoC utilizes four PATH programs with specific providers trained to engage persons through street outreach in the Lawrence, Ottawa/Paola, Manhattan and Salina communities. Routinely, law enforcement officials partner with local advocates to assist in identifying and engaging unsheltered persons. They make referrals to shelters and service providers. Additionally, faith based organizations associated with the BoS CoC are frequently sought out by unsheltered persons for assistance, i.e., shelter, food and hygiene kits. During PIT Counts, persons in unsheltered homeless situations are surveyed using structured interviews. County officials are asked to identify possible sites not meant for human habitation where trained volunteers might find homeless individuals and families.

3A. Continuum of Care (CoC) Strategic Planning Objectives

Objective 1: Create new permanent housing beds for chronically homeless persons.

Instructions:

Ending chronic homelessness continues to be a HUD priority. CoCs can do this by creating new permanent housing beds that are specifically designated for this population. In the FY2010 NOFA, chronically homeless persons were defined as an unaccompanied homeless individual with a disabling condition, or a family where at least one adult member had a disabling condition, who has either been continuously homeless for at least a year OR has had at least four episodes of homelessness in the past three (3) years.

Describe the CoC's short-term (12 month) plan to create new permanent housing beds for persons who meet HUD's definition of chronically homeless (limit 1000 characters):

One new permanent supportive housing program was funded through the 2010 CoC competition. The program will open in late 2011, once the HUD contract is executed, and will designate 2 beds to specifically serve the chronically homeless population. In addition, the VA is expected to release up to 50 HUD VASH vouchers, up to 60% of which will be designated for chronically homeless persons. The CoC will continue outreach and advocacy efforts with the HOME Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) programs to set aside beds for those who have disabilities and meet HUD's definition of chronically homeless. Collaboration will continue with the Veterans Administration and HUD 811 projects across the state to develop partnerships with service providers to utilize the HUD VASH program and possible HUD 811 facilities for chronically homeless persons.

Describe the CoC's long-term (10 year) plan to create new permanent housing beds for persons who meet HUD's definition of chronically homeless (limit 1000 characters):

As stated above, the CoC has initiated and will continue its efforts to connect with/utilize other possible funding streams outside of HUD's CoC Homeless Assistance Program to create permanent housing beds. Other avenues include: the CoC utilizing a scoring system for new CoC project applications each year that awards extra points for the percentage of chronic homeless individuals to be served, the CoC working with state and local planning groups (i.e. Governor's Planning Council on Mental Health-Subcommittee on Homelessness and Housing, Kansas Interagency Council on Homelessness and private housing developers) through monthly regional coordinator contacts to identify areas of greatest need for permanent housing within the BoS and directing strategic efforts toward these areas to produce new beds.

3A. Continuum of Care (CoC) Strategic Planning Objectives

Objective 2: Increase the percentage of participants remaining in CoC funded permanent housing projects for at least six months to 77 percent or more.

Instructions:

Increasing self-sufficiency and stability of permanent housing program participants is an important outcome measurement of HUD's homeless assistance programs. Each SHP-PH and S+C project is expected to report the percentage of participants remaining in permanent housing for more than six months on its Annual Performance Report (APR). Describe the CoCs short-term (12 month) plan to increase the percentage of participants remaining in CoC-funded permanent housing projects for at least six months to 77 percent or higher (limit 1000 characters):

The CoC will review and evaluate current project performance by grantees to determine how the higher functioning programs are achieving their outcomes and provide technical assistance to programs performing below the 77% threshold. Through regular regional coordinator contact, the annual summit and other targeted training, the CoC will encourage best practices including strengths-based case management and housing first/rapid rehousing models that are evidence based for improving the housing stability for participants. The CoC coordinator and HMIS lead agency will conduct annual project monitoring that will include a review of project performance and HMIS implementation to track outcomes.

Describe the CoCs long-term (10 year) plan to increase the percentage of participants remaining in CoC-funded permanent housing projects for at least six months to 77 percent or higher (limit 1000 characters):

The CoC will continue the efforts noted above. In addition, new and renewal projects will be encouraged/required to meet CoC identified target performance measures with regard to the percentage of participants remaining in permanent housing for at least six months. The CoC will consider reallocation of funds annually as allowed based on actual performance achieved by projects. The CoC will continue to provide training in response to areas of greatest need to retain participants in permanent housing and advocate for additional services needed to assist in stabilizing program participants who have a disabling condition.

3A. Continuum of Care (CoC) Strategic Planning Objectives

Objective 3: Increase the percentage of participants in CoC-funded transitional housing that move into permanent housing to 65 percent or more.

Instructions:

The transitional housing objective is to help homeless individuals and families obtain permanent housing and self-sufficiency. Each SHP-TH project is expected to report the percentage of participants moving to permanent housing on its Annual Performance Report (APR). CoCs then use this data from all of the CoC-funded transitional housing projects to report on the overall CoC performance on form 4C. Continuum of Care (CoC) Housing Performance.

At this time the CoC has exceeded HUD's threshold as 67% of those that have left transitional housing during the last program year, moved to permanent housing. In order to maintain and build on current performance, the CoC will continue to encourage service providers to utilize effective best practices which include strengths-based case management and rapid rehousing/housing first models in addition to client specific supportive services. The CoC will recognize and promote high performing programs through regional coordinator contact, the annual summit, and other targeted training to encourage peer to peer technical assistance for lower performing programs.

Describe the CoCs long-term (10 year) plan to increase the percentage of participants in CoC-funded transitional housing projects that move to permanent housing to 65 percent or more (limit 1000 characters):

The CoC will continue action steps as noted above. In addition, new and renewal projects will be encouraged/required to meet CoC identified target performance measures with regard to the percentage of participants leaving transitional housing and moving to permanent housing upon program exit. The CoC will consider reallocation of funds annually as allowed based on actual performance achieved by projects. The CoC will continue to provide training in response to areas of greatest need to assist programs in meeting set thresholds and to develop better service plans to help participants achieve permanent housing. The CoC and service providers will also advocate for additional specific services needed to assist those who may fall short of reaching this overall goal, and will collaborate with housing partners to develop additional safe, affordable, and appropriate housing.

3A. Continuum of Care (CoC) Strategic Planning Objectives

Objective 4: Increase percentage of participants in all CoC-funded projects that are employed at program exit to 20 percent or more.

Instructions:

Employment is a critical step for homeless persons to achieve greater self-sufficiency, which represents an important outcome that is reflected both in participants' lives and the health of the community. Each CoC-funded project (excluding HMIS dedicated only projects) is expected to report the percentage of participants employed at exit on its Annual Performance Report (APR). At this time the CoC has exceeded the threshold of 20% of participants exiting CoC projects as 32% were employed at program exit (based on 2010 APR data as directed). Through the 2011 Point In Time Count it was estimated that up to 44% of all homeless persons were disabled. This significantly impacts their ability to secure employment. Given the current state of the economy in addition to the previous statement, it is not anticipated by the CoC that improvement for this objective will occur over the next twelve months. The CoC will continue to work with workforce development agencies and supported employment partners to secure employment for program participants who are able to work.

Describe the CoCs long-term (10 year) plan to increase the percentage of participants in all CoC-funded projects who are employed at program exit to 20 percent or more (limit to 1000 characters):

To maintain or build upon our current performance, the CoC will work to increase the participation of workforce development, supported employment, and veterans employment service providers, as well as local businesses and other diverse stakeholders, in strategic planning meetings in the eight regions, and in the overall BoS CoC planning process. The CoC will also increase the participation of the KS Department of Social & Rehabilitation Services, Vocational Rehabilitation Services specialists with our projects. New projects within the CoC will be scored based on a clear demonstration of how they will assist participants to increase their employment upon program exit.

3A. Continuum of Care (CoC) Strategic Planning Objectives

Objective 5: Decrease the number of homeless households with children.

Instructions:

Ending homelessness among households with children, particularly for those households living on the streets or other places not meant for human habitation, is an important HUD priority. CoCs can accomplish this goal by creating new beds and/or providing additional supportive services for this population.

Describe the CoCs short-term (12 month) plan to decrease the number of homeless households with children (limit 1000 characters):

With the recent change in the definition of homelessness through the HEARTH Act, and the slow economic recovery, the CoC anticipates a leveling off of the number of homeless households with children in the next year. However, the CoC will continue to utilize HPRP funding until it is exhausted, and the new ESG, along with existing BoS HUD funded projects, to move families from homelessness to permanent housing. This year's BoS application includes three new projects proposing 16 units of housing for households with children, four permanent supportive housing.

Describe the CoCs long-term (10 year) plan to decrease the number of homeless households with children (limit 1000 characters):

The CoC has begun and will continue outreach and advocacy efforts to work with mainstream programs that offer rental and supportive services to develop holistic service plans to move families out of homelessness. These action steps include: identification and referral of homeless families by school district liaisons; work with Public Housing Authorities and other subsidized housing programs to gain priority for homeless families on Section 8 and other housing waiting lists; develop relationships with private landlords and other housing providers to work with this targeted group who face multiple rehousing barriers; work with housing developers and local branches of government to show the need for additional affordable housing units in communities; and advocate for increased wages and jobs across the state of Kansas to help families maintain housing once they obtain it.

3B. Continuum of Care (CoC) Discharge Planning

Instructions:

The McKinney-Vento Act requires that State and local governments have policies and protocols in place to ensure that persons being discharged from publicly-funded institutions or systems of care are not discharged immediately into homelessness. Foster Care (Youth Aging Out):

Youth who leave the foster care system because they have attained 18 years of age are eligible to participate in Independent Living Services through the Chafee Foster Care Independence Program. This is a voluntary program and at age 18 young adults may choose not to participate. The program offers funds to help pay the costs of setting up a household, such as rent and utility deposits, buying household goods, etc. The program also offers a monthly subsidy for up to 36 months as long as the young adult is eligible.

Starting at age 16, and prior to discharge/release at 18 years of age, youth participate in planning for their transition. Transition planning involves helping the youth identify specific goals for housing, employment, and education that they can accomplish when they are released from custody at age 18. Youth are assisted in preparing for their goals with information about services available through the six SRS Independent Living Coordinators across the state. They are also provided with support in acquiring skills that will help them achieve self sufficiency.

Health Care:

The State of Kansas is still in the development phase of establishing a protocol/policy preventing health care institutions from discharging patients into homelessness. The Kansas Department of Aging follows state and federal regulations in relation to discharge planning; however, neither state nor federal regulations address the assurance that residents will be discharged into housing. The Kansas Department on Aging has agreed to participate as a member of the Kansas Interagency Council on Homelessness (KICH) and the Kansas Health Policy Authority will be invited as well. Further discussion of health care discharge protocols are anticipated in future meetings of the KICH which include The Kansas Statewide Homeless Coalition.

Mental Health:

The Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS), which includes Mental Health and Foster Care, enacted a policy in 2006 that ensures to the maximum extent possible that all individuals who are discharged from State-funded institutions or systems of care have housing options available in order to prevent being discharged into homelessness. However, an individual can exercise their right to refuse treatment and/or aid with placement and therefore become homeless upon discharge. In FY 2011, the Kansas State Psychiatric Hospitals (SPH) discharged 3,963 persons. Of those persons, 4.5% were reported as being discharged into homelessness. A Kansas Medicaid managed care agency, contracted by SRS, instituted a Discharge Planning Team that works with SPH's and Mental Health Centers for discharge planning assistance. In addition, Kansas has implemented SOAR statewide, including the Kansas SPH's.

The CoC has built partnerships within the mental health field including mental health agencies as Grantees for CoC funded projects.

Corrections:

The Kansas Department of Corrections (KDOC) has a formal policy regarding release and discharge planning, with planning for all offenders beginning at 16 months pre-release, or upon admission if their length of incarceration is less than 16 months. Offenders are assessed for risk and need, and plans are developed for their return to the community. Specialized reentry and discharge planning staff are in all facilities working with offenders. Housing specialists in Topeka, Kansas City and Wichita support release and discharge planners in their effort to find suitable housing for offenders. There are still many barriers, but the issue is receiving increased attention by case managers and specialists in the corrections system. In the state's 2011 fiscal year, KDOC data showed that 7% of all individuals were released to homelessness and or emergency shelter/housing, 33% were released to at risk housing (friends, mentors, structured or residential housing) while over 60% were released to stable housing (self or with family members). To assist ex-offenders upon release, KDOC recently implemented SOAR throughout the Kansas corrections system.

3C. Continuum of Care (CoC) Coordination

Kansas BoS received \$8,360,995 in HPRP funds. The KS BoS CoC broadcasted the announcement of funds available on its website and via its listserv. KS BoS CoC staff worked with the state agency administrating HPRP funds to develop the grant selection process, and served on the committee to review and recommend the successful applicants. KS BoS CoC encouraged and supported member agencies to apply for the available funds, of which some were successful. As HMIS is required for HPRP providers the BoS CoC, and the administering agency, will continue to work in partnership to assist and support further implementation and utilization of the HMIS system for service providers across the state.

Describe how the CoC is participating in or coordinating with any of the following: Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) initiative, HUD VASH, or other HUD managed American Reinvestment and Recovery Act programs (2500 character limit)?

KS BoS CoC members make public comment on, and actively participate in, the planning process for the Kansas Consolidated Plan, which includes CDBG/NSP. KS BoS CoC members actively participate and sustain on-going representation on committees addressing each of the aforementioned initiatives. The KS BoS CoC serves as an information and referral resource and works to ensure BoS CoC service providers are utilizing each of these resources and programs for their participants as appropriate.

Outreach efforts by the CoC to connect with the Veterans Administration and VASH program have been successful. HUD VASH vouchers are now being utilized in several counties in the BoS. As a direct result of the BoS's advocacy efforts the VA has released 50 new VASH vouchers in the last 12 months that are being utilized in the BoS. There is a Veterans hospital that includes a 200 bed domiciliary and two large military bases within the BoS. The need is great throughout the BoS and we continue to advocate for additional vouchers. A regional homeless Veterans planning meeting has been scheduled for the near future and the BoS will be one of the key participants in this meeting.

The Kansas State Department of Education(KSDE)oversees the Plan for Education for Homeless Children and Youth:

Describe the CoC's efforts to collaborate with local education agencies to assist in the identification of homeless families and inform them of their eligibility for McKinney-Vento education services. (limit 1500 characters)

School District Homeless Liaisons are invited and encouraged to participate in Regional Planning meetings for the BoS CoC and to participate in the BoS CoC Committee. A representative of KSDE (the State Coordinator for the Education of Homeless Children and Youth) serves on the Kansas Point In Time Count partnership and several liaisons serve on the BoS PIT Committee for their regions. School District Homeless Liaisons and the KSDE State Coordinator have presented workshops at the Annual Kansas Summit on Homelessness and Housing for the past 4 years. Homeless Liaisons which are employed within every school district throughout the BoS work to identify families experiencing homelessness. After identification has been made, staff work to educate families about McKinney-Vento and available services.

The CoC will reinforce to all homeless service providers the need to collaborate with local LEA's(Local Education Agency), and adjust intake forms to better reflect school age children and their McKinney-Vento educational rights. The BoS CoC Committee Chairperson is currently employed as the McKinney-Vento Education Coordinator at a school district within the Balance of State.

Describe how the CoC has, and will continue, to consider the educational needs of children when families are placed in emergency or transitional shelter. (limit 1500 characters)

BoS CoC program providers and homeless liaisons, through collaboration with school districts, work to ensure placement of families with children as close as possible to their school of origin so as not to disrupt the child's education. An intake assessment is utilized which identifies an educational list of needs that includes: enrollment status in school/pre-school, including school of origin, and other special programs. During the intake process with families and youth the following topics are covered: concerns about school attendance, particularly fears regarding domestic violence, and a plan of action to address them; how changing schools may impact the child's educational, social and emotional well-being; and the development of an education plan as part of the family's overall case plan. Additionally collaboration with the school district is employed for establishing shelter-based tutoring programs and study areas with educational resources, computers, calculators and books. The late meal option is also offered for children to participate in after school programs and extracurricular activities.

Describe the CoC's current efforts to combat homelessness among veterans. Narrative should identify organizations that are currently serving this population, how this effort is consistent with CoC strategic plan goals, and how the CoC plans to address this issue in the future.(limit 1500 characters)

For the past 10 years, the BoS CoC, has worked closely with the Veterans Administration(VA)to address the needs of homeless veterans. The Kansas Statewide Homeless Coalition which is the lead agency for the CoC has had an individual from the VA on its Board of Directors for a number of years. This individual works full-time for the VA providing services to Veterans and their families affected by homelessness. In the last 3 years the VA has awarded funding from their Grant Per Diem program to the cities of Emporia and Leavenworth Kansas. Additionally, the VA has expanded the permanent housing options available to veterans through the creation of the HUD Veterans Supported Housing (HUD VASH) program. In Leavenworth County, 132 new units of permanent housing have been established in the last 3 years. BoS service providers work with the Colmery O'Neil VA in Topeka, the Robert J. Dole VA in Wichita and the Dwight D. Eisenhower VA in Leavenworth to obtain supportive services for veterans in these housing units. These activities are consistent with the CoC's goal of working with the VA to obtain the necessary resources needed to serve this target population. CoC future efforts will be to continue to work with the VA to utilize the HUD VASH program and to obtain additional transitional and permanent housing opportunities in a number of rural communities where, historically, the VA has not provided housing services.

Describe the CoC's current efforts to address the youth homeless population. CoC members work with school district liaisons to make sure that school districts are identifying and serving homeless youth. School district liaisons make sure that the educational needs of the students are being met. They also work with CoC and other social service agencies to make sure that students and families are referred to appropriate personnel in and around the community for their needs outside of the educational setting. School district liaisons serve on CoC committees. The State Coordinator from the Kansas Department of Education serves on the Point In Time Count committee along with the CoC and works with the Balance of State, including serving on the Kansas Statewide Homeless Coalition Board of Directors. The State Coordinator also serves on the committee which is writing the 10-year plan for the State of Kansas.

3D. Hold Harmless Need (HHN) Reallocation

The new PSH project approved in 2010 has yet to sign a contract so the CoC was unable to include the 2 chronic beds in that program this year. 50 HUD VASH vouchers were added, 30 of them for the chronically homeless, but they did not come on line until April 2011. 18 of 22 persons (81%) exited the CoC's permanent housing programs after staying 6 months or longer. Stayers brought our performance down to 70% although it is impossible to determine based on the APR alone how many entered less than 6 months prior to the program year end, thus making it impossible for them to achieve this goal. We are very proud of the CoC's performance in moving persons from transitional housing to permanent housing in the last year surpassing our own expectations and setting a standard for us to meet/exceed in the coming years. We project that the number of homeless families increased due to the failure of the economy to rebound in the last year combined with the increased housing inventory within the CoC bringing them into our PIT. We continue to work to meet the challenges inherent in a BoS CoC which covers a large geographic area (101 counties), primarily rural/frontier, with the inherent lack of services available for homeless persons, or the transportation needed to obtain them. Each year we strengthen our coordination through the eight regions of the CoC each with a designated coordinator.






